## Looking Beyond Our Walls: *Outreach & Wider Mission at Christ Church*

Over the past several years, Christ Church has taken leadership roles in many new outreach projects and ministries. These new initiatives complement our ongoing work with the Back to School project, St. Michael's Food Bank, and direct appeals for Episcopal Relief & Development (ERD), United Thank Offering (UTO) and Children's Home Foundation. One of our newest initiatives is the St. Michael's Faith Build in conjunction with Habitat for Humanity. Another major project is the Honduran Dental Mission in Tegucigalpa. This project was an outgrowth of our ongoing relationship with El Hogar in Honduras—an Episcopal orphanage and school. In 2005, 2006 and 2007, we sent work teams to El Hogar. On June 12<sup>th</sup> we are sending another work team to the school and ask that you hold the team members in your prayers during their time away. All of our outreach efforts at Christ Church are undertaken as tangible signs of living out our baptismal promises to proclaim by word and example the good news of God in Christ; to seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself; and to strive for justice and peace among all people and respect the dignity of every human being. Volunteers and supporters are always needed and appreciated.

At the end of April, I was one of nine people from Christ Church to go to Holy Cross Monastery in West Park, New York, for retreat where our time was divided between attending worship in the chapel (five times each day), enjoying meals in the refectory with the brothers and other guests, gathering as a group with Brother Adam as our facilitator and free time to do whatever we pleased: walk, run, nap, read, pray. The general theme of the retreat had to do with taking a new look at what we believe and particularly exploring what the resurrection means to us. The season of the church was Easter and the season of the world was Spring—an appropriate time to think about the meaning of the cross and to see our faith with fresh eyes. Together, we wondered and questioned and stated all sorts of things. Each person had his or her own perspective and experience but, universally people agreed that this opportunity to think and talk about what we *really* believe was meaningful and important.



Typically, when I go on retreat, I have some sort of agenda in mind for myself. While I do set aside the time to be open to whatever God has in store for me, usually there is something about which I have been wondering and am eager to ponder. Always a journal goes into my bag, because I figure that by filling its pages I will find all the answers I seek. This time, along with bringing an empty notebook, I brought old journals, letters and scraps of paper, because I wanted to ground myself in past thoughts as well as consider new ideas. It was an interesting exercise that answered some old questions and also opened up some new ones. It seems to me that so often in the exploration of our faith, there is a sort of natural ebb and flow of certainty and uncertainty.

It is summer on the Eastern Shore of Maryland and one of the things that I love about this season around here, is that it seems as if there is more time. The programs of the church go into planning mode, our Sunday mornings are a little shorter, daylight lasts a little longer and it is a little like being on retreat, or maybe you’d call it vacation. Either way, I encourage you to embrace these summer months. Welcome your family and friends, engage in all the activities you love; because these things will refresh and sustain you. Also, remember that as I told vestry members at their retreat day in March: Christ Church holds services in the summertime too! I hope to see you at the farmer’s market, on the water, beside the swimming pool, in your backyard and also, at church because it is one of the places where questions are raised and sometimes even answered and where we can all be restored.

## Sunday Morning Hospitality

It's that time of year again. Summer is upon us and we all know what that means for those who live in and around St. Michaels: gardening, sailing, fishing, ice cream, corn on the cob, tourists, traffic and, of course, the risk that someone visiting on a Sunday morning may be sitting in "your" pew. A few years ago, one of our regular 8 o'clock parishioners sat behind a couple visiting Christ Church and greeted the couple during the exchange of the "Peace" with the words, "You're sitting in my pew." That gentleman has since gone on to his heavenly reward and, more importantly, that visiting couple are now active members of our parish in spite of the unusual and less than welcoming greeting they received. In 2008, we ran as the cover story to an issue of the *Tidings* a piece titled "How to Respond When Someone Sits in Your Pew" from *The Episcopal Handbook* by Morehouse Publishing. Because summer is the prime

time for visitors to St. Michaels—some of whom eventually relocate here and join our parish—I'd like to revisit that article to put us in the proper mood for the summer months. *The Episcopal Handbook* suggests that whenever our bubble of personal space and territorial instinct is violated on a Sunday morning by a newcomer or visitor, that there are at least three positive responses:

- 1. Smile and greet the "intruders."** These visitors are generally unaware that they've accidentally displaced you from your birthright. So, look them in the eye, greet them like you mean it, and leave no impression that they've done something wrong.
- 2. View the "intrusion" as an opportunity.** Remember that you do not own the pew; you just borrow it once a week. Take the opportunity to get out of your rut and sit someplace new. This may yield new spiritual discoveries.
- 3. If you can tell that your new friends feel uncomfortable at having displaced you, make an extra effort to welcome them.** Consider taking them breakfast, Lemonade on the Lawn, or to brunch after church to become acquainted.

How we greet and welcome others—both friends and strangers—is an integral aspect of what is known as the "Sunday experience"—everything that the typical parishioner or visitor experiences on a Sunday morning. This includes not only the worship and music, the sermon, the theological and cultural leanings that make up the general ethos of the parish, but also the friendliness of the greeters, ushers and those seated near us, the feel of the coffee hour or social offering, the availability of parking and whether the nursery and bathrooms are clean. As such, our appearance and demeanor on Sunday tells those around us if we are ready and welcoming in much the same way that a host or hostess prepares his or her home for a gathering or dinner party. After all, the primary aspect of our corporate worship, week after week, Sunday after Sunday, is the meal that we share with one another called Holy Eucharist or holy communion.

This spring as you put away your snow skis, squash rackets, shotguns—or in my case rugby boots—and turn your attention to summer pastimes such as gardening, sailing, golf and tennis, think of how these long warm days encourage us to be more welcoming, outgoing and inclusive of others. Do it in the name of Christ. Do it in the name of neighborliness. But "Just do it."

### What is going on at the chapel altar during communion? – Abigail Nestlehutt

Maybe you know, or maybe you have asked yourself this very question at some point in time. Each Sunday we offer special prayers for healing at the chapel altar during the administration of communion. Our team of dedicated volunteers: Peter Houck, Bev Keegan, Elizabeth Morgan, Lesley Moyer, and Alice Utterback, listen to the concerns of parishioners who come to them and then they pray and anoint the person's forehead with oil. Most people come to the rail with concerns having to do with spiritual, physical or emotional healing. Some people come seeking prayers to celebrate joyful moments. Still others do not explain why they come. In all cases, the information that is exchanged at the healing altar remains confidential.

The *Book of Common Prayer* offers some information on healing prayers beginning on page 455 as part of the section for Ministration to the Sick. The prayers suggested there offer some insight to what we are doing when we pray for healing:

I lay my hands upon you in the Name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, beseeching him to uphold you and fill you with his grace, that you may know the healing power of his love. *Amen.*

We cannot predict how God will respond to our prayers—perhaps especially our prayers for healing. When I was a new priest, I met a woman who was frustrated and angry about the weekly healing service that our church offered because her husband had cancer, they had a young daughter and she believed that no prayers would keep him from dying. She was right.

That is why I think the words above are helpful. At a time when so much is unknown or painful we can pray with assurance that God's love is powerful enough to heal; perhaps not cure but to heal. And we can ask God to uphold and fill up all people who come to us in any kind of need.

If you have any questions about the healing altar at Christ Church, please speak with one of the volunteers or with any of the clergy. We would be happy to speak with you.

### Adult Inquirers Course

Are you new to the church or coming from another denomination? Twice each year—during the fall and early spring—Christ Church offers an “Inquirer’s Class” for adults who would like to learn a little more about Christianity, the Episcopal Church and the traditions and teachings that you may have forgotten or never knew. The Inquirer’s Class is strongly recommended for anyone considering Confirmation—the mature act of affirming one's commitment to his or her baptismal promises—or Reception—the act of publicly welcoming those who were confirmed in another tradition into the Episcopal Church. Both Confirmation and Reception occur during the Bishop’s annual visitation. If interested, please speak with one of the clergy.

In the *Gospel According to Matthew*, we are offered some assurance: “Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you.” Matthew 7:7 These words are both comforting and frustrating at times. It is a comfort to know that our needs, desires and longings may be met if only we ask, but it is frustrating when our queries are not answered as swiftly or directly as we might like. Still, the power of prayer is tremendous. Most of us maintain some sort of practice of prayer. Some have chosen to be a part of the Prayer Chain and promise to pray regularly for a special list of concerns.

The Prayer Chain is one aspect of our Pastoral Care program as, through prayer, we respond to the pastoral needs of the parish. The members of the group meet monthly on a Sunday following the 10:15AM service in order to check in and receive updates and we welcome new members at any time.
