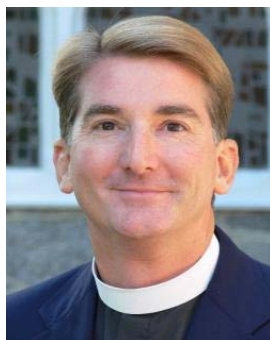

## 10-10-10

Several years ago I recall being asked if I was prepared for September 9, 1999. As you may recall, that was the upcoming “doomsday” date. The thinking was that upon reading 9-9-99, computers would fail along with ATMs and most of our technical infrastructure. Some Christians even predicted that 9-9-99 would mark the Second Coming. It seems that we human beings are intrigued by particular dates. I once married a couple on July 7, 2007 who had gone to great lengths to have 07-07-07 for their wedding date.

So, it was not surprising that 10-10-10 was a big date for many people as well, my family included. On October 10, 2010—when the church’s lectionary was kind enough to give us a passage about 10 lepers—almost 40,000 people chose to mark the occasion by running the Chicago Marathon and another 1.2 million lined the 26.2 mile course (I was in the latter group and Abigail was in the former group). It was an august occasion and many of the runners were first-time marathoners. My wife, Abigail, was running her fifth marathon, but it was her first since the 2001 Chicago Marathon, which pre-dated the birth of our elder child, Asa. Same course, same Columbus Day weekend, but separated by a space of 9 years.

Modern-day marathons are a mix of athletic event, carnival, “bucket list”, and travelogue. With that in mind we made the long weekend a family event. For four hours of the weekend, Abby ran brilliantly and Asa, Honor and I cheered proudly. The balance of the time we spent exploring the Marathon Expo, Lincoln Park Zoo, Shedd Aquarium, Chicago History Museum, Navy Pier and the Magnificent Mile, which included a stop at The American Girl Store—Mecca for most girls age 5-9. We shared meals with friends, dined in familiar restaurants, and walked the old neighborhood.

On Sunday evening, after Abigail had run the grueling race and the children and I had managed—via a few cabs and L trains—to spot her at five different points along the course, we walked into St. Chrysostom’s Church in Chicago’s Gold Coast for the 5:15 PM Eucharist. During the sermon the rector, Ray Webster, welcomed us and made some complimentary and touching remarks about clergy relationships and “team ministry”. Ray noted that while clergy may like to think of themselves as complete and all too often “perfect”, colleagues remind us that the sum of us is greater than the parts. In other words, parishes with multiple clergy on staff benefit from the plurality of voices, styles, spiritualities and gifts provided by the team.

I am reminded of how “the sum is greater than the parts” when I think of All Saints’ Day. A “saint” is a person who is connected in a special way to God, and in our faith tradition we speak of the sainthood of all faithful Christians—saints and martyrs, known or unknown. On All Saints’ Day we remember our fellow Christians—those who came before us, those living today, and those who will come after us. Much like the 40,000 runners who ran the Chicago Marathon, we are never in this alone and there is strength and encouragement in numbers. This All Saints’ Day, as we pause and remember our parishioners who died during the past year, look around at those seated near you—those living saints—and give thanks and say a prayer for them for strength for the continuing journey.

## For All the Saints

I've always enjoyed reading and learning about the saints. Growing up as a Roman Catholic, I often said the prayer to Saint Anthony for lost items. "Saint Anthony, Saint Anthony, look all around. Something has been lost and can't be found." I recall another prayer, from those less enlightened days, "Saint Ann, Saint Ann, find me a man!"

Anglicans don't pray to the saints; but we do honor and remember those who have gone before us in the faith. We commemorate the inspiring men and women who bore witness to Christ's love through their courage, selflessness and service. The Book of Common Prayer explains the communion of saints as "the whole family of God, the living and the dead, bound together in Christ by sacrament, prayer and praise."



I've been browsing through a new book called Holy Women, Holy Men, Celebrating the Saints. It provides some interesting history about the Anglican calendar of the saints. The first Book of Common Prayer included feasts for saints of the New Testament. The 1662 Prayer Book, used here before the War of Independence listed 67 saints, but no liturgical commendations were provided. In 1964 General Convention authorized liturgies for over a hundred saint's days and since that time, Lesser Feasts and Fasts has been revised every three years as our calendar has increased.

Holy Women, Holy Men, published this year, includes some rather surprising saints. Theologians John Calvin, Karl Barth and Teilhard de Chardin are remembered and honored. Scientists Copernicus and Kepler are included. Poet Christina Rossetti and author G.K. Chesterton are too. My favorite "new" saint is Florence Li Tim-Oi, first woman priest ordained in the Anglican Communion on January 25, 1944. Bishop Hall of Hong Kong responded to the severe shortage of priests after Japan invaded by recognizing that her very active lay ministry would be better served and that "God's work would reap better results if she had the proper title of priest."

I am delighted that the Episcopal Church has searched history to find examples of Christ's prophetic voice and vision in all the varied vocations of this life. I am inspired to keep seeking God's goodness and grace expressed in real lives lived in the real world. Who knows who will be the saints of tomorrow? One thing is certain, as our world grows smaller through technological advances, our ideas about how the light of Christ shines today will grow and expand.

*We pray that, encouraged by the example of the saints, aided by their prayers, and strengthened by their fellowship, we also may be partakers of the inheritance of the saints in light.*

## **A Look Back at the Economic Impact of Slavery on the United States & St. Michaels Parish** -- Peggy R. Rogers

In 2006, the Episcopal General Convention passed a resolution to study the economic benefits derived from slavery in the United States. Bishop Shand asked me, as a deputy to the convention who had voted for the resolution, to conduct a study of slavery's impact on Christ Church, St. Michaels Parish. I delivered my completed study to Bishop Shand, who will report it to the national church. A Xerox copy of my study may be found in our church library, along with seven books containing background material on the subject, both local and national.

It should be noted that in April 2011, Brown University and Harvard University will jointly host a conference on slavery and American economic development, entitled "Slavery and Capitalism in the United States." The conference will be held April 7-9 in Providence, RI and Cambridge, MA.
