Docent's Guild – Linda Makosky

As September begins, we have two months left in our season of duty. Our record book indicates that there were some very busy days, some quiet days, and some days when no one at all dropped in on the patient docent. To date, the highest number of visitors for one day each month was 32 on May 19th, 44 on June 21st, 52 on July 25th, and 47 on August 6th

Mary Len Trippe was on duty the July day that 52 people turned up. She said that visitors especially enjoy hearing about the thoughtful generosity of Queen Anne, who provided funds for "Chapels of Ease". These small chapels were sited about ten miles apart so that churchgoers would not have to ride horseback or walk more than five miles in either direction. The earliest chapel, dating from the early 1700's, was known as "Dundee". It was on the northeast side of the Miles river, close to the path to Longwoods. In 1724, the Rev. Henry Nichols reported traveling to Dundee Chapel on alternate Sundays. Mary Len commented that even when her father was a boy in Royal Oak the roads were so bad one traveled by horseback or water during the winter months.

Queen Anne ascended to the throne in 1702. Mary Len mentioned that she was the last of the Stewarts to reign. Her consideration for the colonial churches is also exemplified in the communion silver displayed in the security case and the baptismal font below the pulpit.

CAMP EDGE, Experience and Discover God Everywhere, was enjoyed by many children and young adults for an entire week in July, across the street at St. Lukes. Youth from the Bay Hundred area came together again this summer for stories, glorious music, good snacks and lots of good Christian fun!

Every year for Vacation Bible School we pick a mission/ outreach project for the kids to support. Most often we have chosen projects that support relief efforts in impoverished foreign countries. This year we decided to support local needs and people. We collected food for the St. Michaels Food Pantry. Nancy and John Masone came one evening and explained how the pantry works and who it supported – Well the kids took whole heartedly to the mission and collected hundreds of pounds of food during the week. It was truly amazing!

I think back on the summers that I have volunteered with this evangelical romp and try to figure why I continually get drawn back every year. New Disciple Bible Study – Christopher Whyman

“Invitation to Genesis”

“In the beginning . . .” These first words in Genesis may be among the most familiar words in all the Bible. Many readers of the Bible recognize Genesis as a book that describes the beginning of all things: the Creation. This is certainly true but is only part of the story—the creation of the world only takes up the first two chapters of a fifty-chapter book. What are the other chapters about?

This study approaches the Book of Genesis not simply as a story of the beginning but as a story of beginnings from start to finish. Through the study, participants will be invited to listen afresh to the witness of this opening book of the Hebrew Bible and to understand more clearly God's purpose in beginning to form a people with the likes of Adam and Eve, Abraham and Sarah, and Jacob and Esau.

This 10 week study will commence on Monday September 28th at 7PM and will last for 10 weeks. The study is video based and will be led by Chris Whyman. Participants will require a Bible and will need to purchase the Participant Book (\$10).

The group is limited to about 12 persons and sign up is with Carolyn in the church office.

Quiet time – an introduction to contemplative prayer – Eugenie Drayton

On Saturday, September 26th from 9AM to 12Noon, please join us for an introductory session of contemplative prayer. The purpose of this introductory session is to provide information regarding the six evening sessions that follow, the topics that will be covered, how each session will flow, and have an experience of a contemplative prayer form. The prayer forms work well for either group or personal prayer time. The hope is that by the end of all the sessions, each person will have found a prayer form that calls them into a deeper relationship with God.

The successive Thursday evenings will run from 6:30PM until 8PM. On these evenings, the group will practice one prayer form, reflect on it and then members of the group will have an opportunity to share their experience. Between meetings, group members will be asked to practice the prayer form at least a couple of times. The Thursday evening session will cover:

- October 1 – Presence thru Scripture
- October 8 – Centering Prayer
- October 15 – Presence through Imagery
- October 22 – Presence through Music
- October 29 – Presence through Icons
- November 5 or 12 – Lectio Divina



The date of the last session will depend on whether group members are also scheduled for the fall retreat to Holy Cross Monastery.

Back to School – Judy Sandground

We've had a repeat performance this year. **Once again you have made it possible for us to exceed our fund raising goal!** Generous donations from this congregation will insure that:

- Each child (including some in middle and high school) who needs help will receive it – all will be equipped to participate fully in the learning process and to complete their assignments,
- All those children who live in poverty will be able to purchase the required periodicals and to go on scheduled field trips,
- Sixth graders without the means to purchase them will receive yearbooks,
- Parents of these children will be able to focus their resources on meeting the basic needs of their families and
- Teachers will not feel obligated to purchase supplies for students in their classrooms who cannot afford them.

Our Back to School Program provides resources for students affected by poverty so that they feel included rather than excluded in their classrooms. This is an important benefit but not the only one. Having the right tools and the opportunity to participate builds confidence and success. Hopefully, these children will find school to be a good place – a place where they feel welcome and comfortable. Liking school, we hope, will foster a love for learning. And we also hope that this desire to learn will ultimately result in enriching the lives of these children, their families and our world.

Thank you for your support of this outreach project. It's like the gift that keeps on giving because it has the potential to have such a long lasting impact.

El Hogar Dental Mission – Jim Campi

We are rapidly approaching our 6th dental mission trip to El Hogar. There have now been 10 work teams since we started this program! Our team from Christ Church will be setting up the clinic for a team from Fredericksburg Virginia. We will be organizing the now completed cabinets and new sink area. A dental tech from Schein Dental Company will be going with us to service all equipment and insure all of the equipment is maintained properly. This type of work will not be needed again for years. The clinic is now complete.

No major purchases will be required and we will recruit donations of supplies as we have the teams to go and treat the kids.

We will be able to expand dental help to kids at a girls school nearby. These girls are in a school type setting as well and receive no dental help as kids. When asked by Rich Kunz if we would include them in our mission work, we of course said yes. The need is huge; we are but a few, but we are growing. We now have 6 different dental teams that will have gone and served and are willing to return. This great response also has the benefit of lower cost since they pay their own way. We are excited about the progress and the upcoming visit by Liz Kinchen to Christ Church on October 11th. Please mark that date for the service and adult forum. I will plan on being there as well.

Christ Church Leads Effort to Build a Home – John Hunnicutt

A joint effort with local churches in partnership with Habitat

Habitat for Humanity of Talbot and Dorchester Counties and Christ Church have joined together to create a coalition of local churches and the St Michaels community to build a simple, decent, affordable home for a deserving family dreaming of homeownership.

Affirming again the commitment of Christ Church to serve those in need, trouble or other adversity through an active outreach to our community, the leadership of our church has undertaken to organize the project with an active involvement of a broad range of St Michaels citizens. A guiding principle of Habitat for Humanity is its focus on the faith community in serving those in need. Thus, the resources and core of volunteers for the effort are the congregations of our local churches. In addition to the active participation of the churches and wider community, the project actively involves local students to be working at the construction site or in the classroom building components for the house.

The project committee at present includes Sherri Sutton and John Hunnicutt, co-chairs; Jim McCloud and Steve Clineberg fund-raising; John Scofield, construction; and Judy Sandgound, communications. A search is underway for a parishioner to lead the volunteer effort. Food Bank News – Nancy Masone

We are pleased to advise that this summer has been both busy and rewarding for the expanding cadre of Food Bank volunteers and supporters. There are also some new initiatives and tidbits of news to report:

1. The Food Bank was “adopted” by the Vacation Bible School class. Students learned about the mission of the Food Bank and every student brought in one or more food items daily to class. The donations resulted in dozens of bags of groceries for our needy clients. Thanks to all who participated.
2. The Farmer’s Market vendors now graciously donate fresh vegetables every Saturday. These are collected and refrigerated by volunteers in the Christ Church parish hall fridge and distributed to clients later in the week.
3. Regular service hours have been established; Mondays 9AM to 11AM, Thursdays 3PM to 5PM and one Thursday evening a month from 5PM to 7PM. A volunteer is there to assist clients in selecting foods based on their specific family size and nutritional or medical needs.
4. The St. Michaels Rotary has donated \$1,000 - our thanks go out to all Rotary members.
5. We have established an additional low income housing contact to assist in helping provide food to shut-ins.
6. Beginning in September, we will restart our “food by the letter” donations. Parishioners are asked to bring in one item and place it in the Food Bank basket located in the Church entrance. For September, please bring in Soups or Stews.
